St Alban was the first English martyr. He was a Roman soldier who converted to Christianity, and legend has it that he exchanged clothes with a priest and was executed in his place, possibly around 304 (or earlier). The first Church was built on the site of his martyrdom in 429, and was later replaced by the Abbey. His feast day is 22nd June (or 17th in C of E).
