
SOME WORDS OF DIETRICH BONHOEFFER

Dietrich Bonhoeffer (4Feb. 1906 - 9April 1945) was a German Lutheran pastor, theologian, anti-Nazi, and founding member of the Confessing Church, started in opposition to the German state Lutheran church, which had capitulated to the Nazis. He expressed opposition to Hitler's euthanasia programme and persecution of the Jews, and was arrested in April 1943 by the Gestapo and imprisoned at Tegel prison for one and a half years. Later he was transferred to Flossenbürg concentration camp, and, after being accused of being associated with the 20 July plot to assassinate Adolf Hitler, was hanged on 9 April 1945.

Dietrich Bonhoeffer has a connection to south London, having been a preacher at the Deutsche Evangelische Kirche in Sydenham between 1933-35. The Church was destroyed in bombing, and its replacement named in his honour in 1958. One of his best-known books is *The Cost of Discipleship*. For him, the cost was his life. The following are a few short excerpts about grace, and a prayer by Dietrich Bonhoeffer:

Cheap grace means the justification of sin without the justification of the sinner. Grace alone does everything, they say, and so everything can remain as it was before... Well, then, let the Christian live like the rest of the world, let him model himself on the world's standards in every sphere of life, and not presumptuously aspire to live a different life under the grace from his old life under sin.... Cheap grace is the grace we bestow on ourselves.... Cheap grace is grace without discipleship, grace without the cross, grace without Jesus Christ, living and incarnate.

Costly grace is the treasure hidden in the field; for the sake of it a man will go and sell all that he has. It is the pearl of great price to buy for which the merchant will sell all his goods. It is the kingly rule of Christ, for whose sake a man will pluck out the eye which causes him to stumble; it is the call of Jesus Christ at which the disciple leaves his nets and follows him. Costly grace is the gospel which must be sought again and again and again, the gift which must be asked for, the door at which a man must knock. Such grace is costly because it calls us to follow, and it is grace because it calls us to follow Jesus Christ. It is costly because it costs a man his life, and it is grace because it gives a man the only true life. It is costly because it condemns sin, and grace because it justifies the sinner. Above all, it is costly because it cost God the life of his Son: 'Ye were bought at a price', and what has cost God much cannot be cheap for us. Above all, it is grace because God did not reckon his Son too dear a price to pay for our life, but delivered him up for us.



O God, early in the morning do I cry unto Thee.

Help me to pray and to think only of Thee.

I cannot pray alone.

In me there is darkness, but in Thee there is light.

I am lonely but Thou leavest me not,

I am feeble in heart but Thou leavest me not.

I am restless, but with Thee there is peace.

In me there is bitterness, but with Thee there is patience.

A carer is anyone who cares, unpaid, for a friend or \3 family member who due to illness, disability, a mental health problem or an addiction cannot cope without their support

Carers Information, Advice and Support (IAS) Service work with carers to ensure they receive the right support and information at the right time, enabling them to continue looking after members of their family, friends and neighbours for as long as they wish to do so. The service supports adult carers who have caring responsibilities for a person aged 18 or over living within the Borough of Lewisham.

We have highly trained staff who provide information advice and support to unpaid carers through a range of social support groups, advice hubs and emotional support. Our service includes providing free counselling services to carers. We are working in Partnership with St Christopher's Hospice to provide bereavement support to carers who have lost a loved one.

Do you have a Post Office card account which your pension is paid into?

From November 2021, the Department for Work and Pensions (DWP) and HM Revenue & Customs (HMRC) will stop making payments, including your state pension, into Post Office card accounts. A Post Office card account (POca) is a special bank account you could only get from the Post Office for automated government payments. You will still get your payment but will have to use a different bank account to draw out your money. You should receive a letter from the DWP soon explaining your next steps.

What do I need to do now?

The letter you get should explain what you need to do, but if you want more information about the steps you need to take you can look on the Post Office website; contact the Post Office contact centre on 0345 722 3344 (or 0345 722 3355 for Typetalk), 8:15am-6pm, Mon-Fri, 8:30am-7:15pm, Sat, closed Sun; or ask in your local Post Office Information from moneyadviceservice.org.uk branch.


