Bring Me Sunshine Spring '23

The Bring Me Sunshine team is very pleased to bring you this newsletter, which we hope you enjoy looking at and which tells you about some opportunities that you will be able to participate in.

It's great that we have entered Spring, a time of new beginnings and fresh starts for some; it has been lovely to see the magnolia tree and the snowdrops in my neighbour's garden bloom again - a constant symbol of this hopeful season.

There seems to be lots to look forward to, including some lovely events brought to you by Bring Me Sunshine (list on page 8). On the 4th April at St.Andrew we keep the theme of Springtime and Easter, so wear your easter bonnets and come along. As well as our events there are coronation celebrations in our different churches - some, including Brownhill Baptist Church, are bringing the community together and will live-stream the coronation of King Charles. Don't lose your vote! From May, photo ID will be needed for you to vote in polling stations (postal voters do not need photo ID).

ID that will be accepted: •Passport •Driving licence •Immigration document •PASS card •Freedom pass and older persons travel card.

The ID can be out of date (e.g expired passport is OK), but the photo needs to bear a likeness to the voter. ID that will not be accepted: Work and student passes, photocopies or pictures on mobile phones. Only original documents can be accepted.

If you do not have any of the required documents, you can apply for a Voter Authority Certificate as photo ID to vote. It is free, and you will need a recent, digital photo of yourself, and your National Insurance number. Without NI number you will need to provide other documents to prove identity e.g. birth certificate, bank statement and utility bill. Apply via gov.uk, or by post using a form available on gov.uk website and returned once completed to your local electoral registration office.

If you are not able to access online services, ask for help from a trusted person to apply for photo ID or a postal vote, or contact Lewisham Electoral Registration Officer, Lewisham Town Hall, SE6 4RU, Tel: 020 8314 6086, e mail: electoral.services@lewisham.gov.uk.

With Easter approaching, Eileen has shared this reflection by Cardinal Désiré-Joseph Mercier, a Belgian Roman Catholic scholar who was born in 1851.

Did you know...Easter was probably named after a festival celebrating Eostre, Pagan Goddess of Spring. Her sacred symbols are thought to have been the hare and the egg. Easter eggs possibly originated from Medieval Europe, but Christians are unlikely to have started the tradition of giving eggs, which are a symbol of fertility and rebirth in many cultures around the world. Chocolate eggs were first produced in 1873 by J.S. Fry & Sons of England, with Cadbury developing the modern chocolate egg two years later. Lilies originated in Japan and did not arrive here until the late 18th century.
